

Roundup of key matters from Pelham Town Council September 18, 2017

Council Highlights

Service levels a high priority for Pelham winter operations

Presented in a report to the Policy and Priorities Committee, Director of public works Andrea Clemencio informed members that the Town of Pelham is not forecast to meet current service levels of winter operations without a significant change to the approach of winter operations and subsequent budgeting.

Currently, the remaining 2017 operating budget for winter operations is likely not sufficient to cover the typical early winter conditions experienced in Pelham.

According to the report there were several factors that played a role in the likely shortfall: approved budget was based on projection and not actuals, adjusted sidewalk contracted services was not included in budget request, and additional 2017 sidewalks and roads have increased the material and labour demand.

"The scope of the report is meant to be a shift in long-term thinking of our winter operations," said Clemencio. "What could we do here that would allow us to address our shortfalls now and allow us to

set a framework for growth - so that as we continue to grow we can continue to keep up our service levels with that growth."

According to Councillor John Durley, the Town of Pelham's services levels are a point of high praise amongst residents.

"The comments that I'm getting from the public is that the level of clearing roads in this town are second to none," said Durley. "How can we maintain our excellent service at an affordable level - we have an excellent reputation for our roads."

The report identified three options to keep the services levels expected by residents of the Town moving forward: Internal winter maintenance for all roads, using additional leased fleet; Outsource winter operations of urban roads to contractor; and internal winter maintenance for all roads, using additional purchased fleet.
